IHCV Medical Mission

In mid-August, I had the pleasure of joining International Healthcare Volunteers (IHCV) on their annual medical mission, one of my favorite events each year. This was my fourth mission trip with IHCV and for me, the most rewarding. Dr. Ifeoma Anidi, a pediatric hospitalist that has participated in IHCV's missions for more than 10 years, and I conducted Pediatric Advanced Life Support training with feedback mannequins for nearly 50 healthcare providers at Cape Coast Teaching Hospital and Cape Coast Metropolitan Hospital (the hospital my two eldest brothers were born). We were elated to find that by the end of the training the confidence of the trainees significantly increased with many of them serving as impromptu trainers for a group of medical students that joined the training on the last day. Medical Knowledge Fiesta

The Medical Knowledge Fiesta (MKF), held September 25–27, was a huge success. Though I was unable to attend the Fiesta in person, I provided a pre-recorded goodwill message that was played on opening day. The 3-day event, attended by approximately 400 medical professionals, scholars, and leaders, addressed the threat of antimicrobial resistance and the important role of healthcare providers in safeguarding medications used to treat infections. The keynote speaker for the annual event was Professor Otchere Addai-Mensah, CEO



of Komfo Anokye Teaching Hospital, who highlighted the grave future that exists if antimicrobial resistance is left unchecked. Dr. Thad Ulzen, former GPSF President, provided a unique presentation on the effect of antibiotic use and resistance on the gut microbiome and its effect on mental health. I'd like to thank Dr. Ulzen and all our members that attended and supported the MKF.

Ghanaian Doctors and Dentists Association of the United Kingdom (GDDA-UK) Annual Meeting

In early October, I attended the 19th Annual Conference and Dinner Dance Fundraising Event of the GDDA-UK. I was accompanied by Dr. Teye Adusu, a longtime member of GPSF. The theme of the conference was “Empowering Lives, Managing the Sickle Cell Disease Patient” and featured two scientific presentations – ‘Current trends in the management of sickle cell disease’ by Dr. David Allotey and ‘Dento-facial manifestations of sickle cell and their management’ by Professor Sandra Hewlett. The meeting was also a celebration of the accomplishments of GDDA-UK on the one-year anniversary of signing their MOU with MDC. I was intrigued to learn that the focus of their efforts is mainly on dentistry, with plans for the first of its kind Dental Conference in Ghana in 2025. My hope is that our two organizations can partner to advance both medical and dental training in Ghana. I had the opportunity to meet the outgoing executive board and welcome the incoming new leaders of the organization; I look forward to our partnership to advance healthcare in Ghana.

Ghana Medical Association (GMA) Annual Meeting in Ho, Ghana

In early November, I was invited to attend the 66th Annual General Conference at the University of Health and Allied Sciences in Ho, Volta Region. The theme for the conference was “Fostering Technology, Entrepreneurship, and Professionalism in Ghana’s Health Sector”. The conference and dinner dance were attended by over one thousand physicians from all regions of Ghana. I was invited to share a solidarity message and took the opportunity to promote the Resident in Training Educational Stipend (RITES) program. Highlights of the event included a heartfelt presidential address by Dr. Frank Serebour, sharing the accomplishments and challenges the organization has faced over the last year; a compelling keynote address by Dr. Agyeman Badu-Akosa, which happened to be presented on the 25th anniversary of his election as

Empowering Future Physicians: Our Residency Mock Interviews

As part of GPSF's ongoing commitment to medical education, the Young Professionals Committee is thrilled to highlight one of our most impactful initiatives this year: the 2024/25 Residency Application Mock Interview Project. This initiative, launched to provide valuable support to residency applicants, has been a testament to the power of community, mentorship, and volunteerism within our organization.

Over the course of a month, we coordinated a series of mock interview sessions designed to help residency applicants hone their interview skills, boost their confidence, and gain insights into the interview process. From mastering their narratives to handling challenging questions, participants received practical feedback and guidance tailored to the high-stakes environment of residency applications. Each session was crafted to mirror the intensity and rigor of real residency interviews, allowing applicants to refine their responses and navigate the pressures they will encounter in actual interviews.

A remarkable aspect of this project was the dedication of our volunteer interviewers. We were fortunate to have a robust team of program directors, attendings and residents generously contribute their time and expertise. Their involvement allowed us to provide personalized feedback to each participant, ensuring a more personal experience that extended beyond simple Q&A sessions. Additionally, the project would not have been possible without the dedication and support of the Young Professionals Committee e-board, who worked tirelessly to successfully coordinate a total of 29 mock interviews.

As we look ahead, we remain committed to empowering the next generation of physicians. Through projects like these, we're not only supporting aspiring doctors but also strengthening the future of healthcare. NONPROFIT ORGANIZATION SPOTLIGHT **International Healthcare Volunteers (IHCV)**

Established in 2001, IHCV is a nonprofit organization headed by Dr. James K. Aikins, Chief Gynecologic Oncologist at Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey. The organization was created after the tragic loss of Dr. Aikins' niece in childbirth. IHCV is dedicated to providing healthcare to women and their families in underserved areas like Ghana and Jamaica, as well as continuing medical education to healthcare professionals in these areas. This year 27 volunteers attended the mission from August 16 to 31. As in prior years, the team was divided in two, with one team heading to Kumasi and the second team heading to Cape Coast. In total 475 adult and pediatric patients were evaluated, 27 surgeries and 20 cervical cancer screenings were performed, 48 healthcare providers were trained in Pediatric Advanced Life Support, and 12 lectures were provided by the two teams. Additionally, the Kumasi team conducted 350 medical screenings at the Jubilee Health Fair.

The mission trip usually culminates with a celebratory event in Accra. This year's closing celebration was a chocolate and tea tasting hosted by [57 Chocolate](#), an African women-owned luxury chocolate brand that evokes 1957 – Ghana's independence. IHCV Mission Trip Reflection—Medical Student Experience

It was a privilege to join the International Health Care Volunteers on their annual medical mission to Ghana. Over the course of two weeks, I gained invaluable insight into both the Ghanaian healthcare system and the rich, vibrant culture of the community. I had the opportunity to rotate through several disciplines, including medicine, surgery, OB/GYN, and pediatrics, encountering a wide range of diseases—many of which were either less common or more advanced than what we typically see in the United States. Something I found fascinating was the astute physical exams skills each Ghanaian provider has, as they focus much less on laboratory and imaging studies due to affordability and access to resources. In fact, the medical students perform their exams on real patients with physical exam findings in contrast to the standardized patients we see in the US.

A particularly impactful resource we provided on the OB/GYN service was an HPV screening clinic for the hospital staff, many of whom had never had a pap smear. This clinic hopefully serves as a way in which we can empower women to take charge of their own health and begin to reduce the high rates of cervical cancer seen in Ghana.

Visiting the historic Cape Coast Castle and enjoying the region’s beautiful rainforests and beaches were tremendous experiences. The relationships I built with our group, as well as the hospital staff and patients, will stay with me forever. I am deeply humbled by the kindness of the Ghanaian people and am grateful for the many lessons I learned from them. I know this experience will remain with me throughout my career.

IHCV Mission Trip Reflection–PGY3 Resident’s Experience

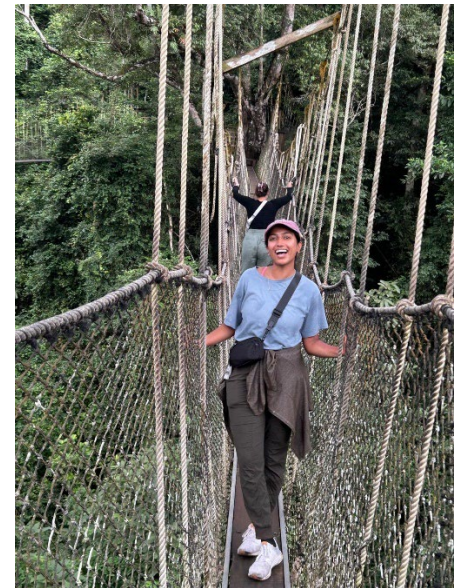
Reflecting on my experience with International Healthcare Volunteers as an OB/GYN resident in Cape Coast, Ghana, I am profoundly moved by the challenges and rewards of providing gynecologic care in this vibrant community. During my time at local hospitals, I managed cases involving abnormal bleeding, pelvic pain, and reproductive health disorders. Collaborating with dedicated local nurses and healthcare workers was inspiring and invaluable, as we worked together to meet the community's needs. A key focus was contributing to cervical cancer screening initiatives. Despite available services, many women and some healthcare providers do not utilize them due to cultural beliefs, fear, and general lack of awareness. I participated in outreach programs to educate women on the importance of early detection and empowering them to take charge of their health through education was truly rewarding. I also learned from local family planning services, observing how community health workers effectively discussed contraceptive options while respecting cultural sensitivities. This was another reminder that sustainable change must be rooted in a community’s values and beliefs.

However, working in a global health setting as a doctor presented ethical dilemmas, particularly in balancing immediate care with long-term systemic issues. The stark realities of limited resources meant making difficult decisions about prioritizing patients, reminding me that while I aimed to make a difference, I was also a temporary presence in a complex system.





Outside of clinical work, I enjoyed exploring Cape Coast, particularly the poignant Cape Coast Castle, which reminded me of the region's complex history and the resilience of its people, as well as the beautiful nearby rainforest and beaches.



As someone who has engaged in the global health sector in various ways before becoming a provider, this experience has profoundly shaped my perspective as an OB/GYN resident. It has reaffirmed my commitment to addressing disparities in reproductive health and to the pursuit of equitable healthcare.

Amidst the music, food, dancing and festivities, our chapter members connected with medical students and other medical professionals who were previously unaware of our organization. Our presence at GhanaFest 2024 allowed us to provide a service to our community while connecting with medical students and other professionals eager to join the foundation. Additionally, we enjoyed the festivities, plentiful food and warm sunshine and look forward to participating in more community events in the future.

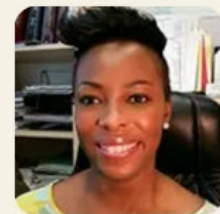

On November 17, 2024, GPSF in collaboration with the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons (GCPS) hosted a highly anticipated webinar entitled [Starting a Healthcare Business in Ghana: A Conversation with HeFRA](#). The attendance of over 100 participants was evidence of the fervent interest in the topic. The panel discussion included a U.S.-based interventional cardiologist and one of GPSF's distinguished lifetime members, Dr. Collins Kwarteng, CEO of City of Hope Hospital and Cardiovascular Center; a Ghana-based physician and healthcare business owner, Dr. Edem Hiadzi, an internationally recognized obstetrician gynecologist and fertility doctor, and Founder and CEO of Lister Hospital and Fertility Centre; and Dr. Philip Bannor, U.S.-trained, board certified internal medicine physician appointed as the Registrar for the Health Facilities Regulatory Agency based in Ghana. Participants acquired substantial insights into the licensing and monitoring of healthcare facilities in Ghana. Future opportunities to delve deeper into this topic are in discussion.
